Community Clothing Repair

- A GUIDE

This compilation from our 'Wear & Care' Research Project is designed to help you activate clothing repair in your community. It is not a definitive guide, but rather a collection of our insights to help empower you to bring your community on a repair journey too.

We held a series of **six pop-up community repair sessions** over six weeks at our RMIT PlaceLab Brunswick Research Studio. Each week, with a group of **no more than 30 people**, we focused on a different aspect of clothes mending, alterations and embellishment via hands-on workshops.

The 'Wear & Care' Community Repair Series was run in partnership with RMIT's School of Fashion and Textiles. We **collaborated with a team of expert menders and researchers** from the Repair Café at RMIT, who are undertaking research exploring garment longevity and durability.

Long Story Short

'Wear & Care' was an exploration into methods of fashion "rewilding" in Brunswick, Melbourne. It gathered locals, retailers, makers, creators, and researchers to learn about and encourage practices that mend, repair and share clothing to build a local response towards a new fashion system.



Why Community Repair Matters?

REMEMBER!

IF YOU ARE THINKING ABOUT ESTABLISHING A REPAIR COMMUNITY, IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE A BIG COMMITMENT.

BRINGING TOGETHER A GROUP OF PEOPLE FOR AS LITTLE AS SIX WEEKS MAKES A HUGE DIFFERENCE.

SO, GIVE IT A GO!

Build Local Community

Community initiatives, like repair cafes, are powerful interventions that do more than repair clothes, but have been evidenced as 'building social relations and practicing non-consumerist forms of citizenship' (Bradley and Persson 2022:1321). Through our events, we fostered new community relationships, with some attendees at events going on to self-organise repair groups beyond the initial project.

Grow Sustainable Practices

Repair has the capacity to extend the life of clothing, as it allows otherwise unworn clothing to return to active use and avoid disposal (Ellen MacArthur Foundation 2017). Through our discussions with local community, we identified small fixes like sewing on a button, can make a big difference in the perceived value of a piece of clothing as it moves through cycles of resale and reuse.

Communicate Clothing Value

These practices offer a communication tool in themselves, as 'the simple fact of making repair visible in the public space helps to transform the social norms around this practice, gradually making it acceptable and standardized' (Madon 2022:546). Through conversations at our events, we found that people's appreciation of the labour and materials, that made their clothes, grew as they interacted with repair processes.

Encouraging people to learn how to mend and practice skills in a communal repair setting, aids in preserving and growing skills, and creates a space to nurture visible and invisible mending (Durrani 2018). Across our repair series, there was a notable shift in engagement from our regular attendees as they grew in confidence and developed their skills over the sessions. Where some attendees may have started by watching and learning techniques to mend their clothes, they were soon discussing repair techniques and mending their own clothes as the series progressed.

3 Find Community

Community repair cafes and self-organised repair groups not only empower citizens with skills and knowledge but can grow communities, aid well-being and strengthen social inclusion (Bradley & Persson 2022). Those who attend also connect to a wider global network of repairers, creating a unique form of environmental activism for a circular future (Moalem & Mosgaard 2021). Across our Community Repair Series, we observed a shift in familiarity and growth in attendee interactions. We learnt from one attendee that a small monthly repair group had formed externally, and although individually they may not have all the mending skills they need, collectively they might.

An attendee at PlaceLab's 'Wear & Care' Community Repair Series There is a growing interest in personal practices that extend the lifecycle of clothes through maintenance and use (Fletcher 2016). By teaching repair techniques and sharing mending and clothing care knowledge at our events, the attendees became equipped with the knowledge, quick fix skills, embellishment ideas and darning tips and tricks to keep their clothing in use for longer.

4 Be Creative

Learning the skills to repair provides an outlet for creativity alongside the practical skills to extend the useful life of clothes. Our Community Repair Series taught attendees visible mending techniques, such as Sashiko, and embellishment styles using iron-on patches and alteration techniques. This is a great way to encourage playfulness and experimentation with clothes. It gives attendees an opportunity to elevate clothes they may otherwise have not worn as often or remove from their wardrobes.



'Satisfaction flows from what we succeed in being and doing with the clothes we have available to us. It is a dynamic relationship between what could be done and what we actually know how to do and be' (Fletcher 2016:225). Amongst our Community Repair Series attendees, the act of mending reflected an experience of self-affirmation and reward from not only repairing clothes for themselves but also for others to return a favour.


We found our repair events worked best through 5 key phases.



PHASE 1

Plan

Consider your goals for the event and whether you will focus on a specific theme, then plan the team you will need to gather to do so.



Promote

Our recommendations for how to promote your event and communicate with your team.

FOR INVITING ATTENDEES

Our tips

- MAKE THE GOALS OF THE EVENT
- SAY WHAT TYPES OF CLOTHING PROBLEMS YOU CAN REPAIR.
- 3. IDENTIFY WHAT REPAIR METHODS YOU'LL BE USING.
- 4. GIVE INSTRUCTIONS ABOUT ACCEPTABLE CLOTHING CONDITIONS.
- 5. EXPLAIN WHAT ADDITIONAL MATERIALS ATTENDEES SHOULD
- 6. PROVIDE CONTACT DETAILS TO ENCOURAGE QUESTIONS PRIOR TO

What You Might Say

COME ALONG TO OUR REPAIR EVENT ON AT AT BY JOINING US, YOU WILL.... (GROW YOUR SKILLS IN MENDING YOUR CLOTHES) AND (CONNECT WITH OTHERS IN THE COMMUNITY). BRING ALONG YOUR CLOTHES THAT NEED(SOME NEW LIFE BREATHED INTO THEM). WE CAN HELP FIX (ZIPS, SEW ON BUTTONS OR HEM THOSE PANTS). IN THIS EVENT, WE WILL BE FOCUSING ON (HAND SEWING TECHNIQUES FOR VISIBLE MENDING). ENSURE ALL THE CLOTHES YOU BRING ALONG ARE WASHED AND CLEAN. IF YOU NEED A SPECIFIC MATERIAL FOR YOUR REPAIR, LIKE A PARTICULAR ZIP, PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN AS WE ONLY HAVE A LIMITED RANGE OF CHOICES. IF YOU AREN'T SURE IF WE CAN HELP FIX SOME OF YOUR CLOTHING. SEND US AN EMAIL AT AS WE WOULD LOVE TO ADVISE/ SUPPORT YOU.

FOR GUIDING REPAIRERS

What You Might Say

WE ARE LOOKING FORWARD TO HAVING YOU CONTRIBUTE TO OUR REPAIR EVENT ON AT IT WOULD BE GREAT IF YOU CAN (ARRIVE 15 MINUTES EARLY TO HELP SET UP) AND IF YOU CAN ALSO (BE PREPARED TO STAY A LITTLE LONGER IF NEEDED). KEEP IN MIND THAT OUR GOAL IS TO (BUILD SKILLS AND COMMUNITY). WE WANT TO HELP AS MANY PEOPLE AS POSSIBLE, SO THINK ABOUT HOW YOU CAN SUPPORT A FEW PROJECTS CONCURRENTLY TO HELP EVERYONE RECEIVE EQUAL ATTENTION. WHEN POSSIBLE, GENTLY ENCOURAGE ATTENDEES TO SHARE SKILLS AND EXPERTISE WITH OTHERS INSTEAD OF IMMEDIATELY SEEKING OUT A REPAIRER.

ALSO, DON'T MISS OPPORTUNITIES TO ENGAGE ATTENDEES IN SMALL PARTS OF THE PROCESS, THIS MIGHT BE THROUGH SUPPORTING THEM TO DO PARTS OF THE REPAIR WHICH ARE SUITABLE FOR THEIR SKILL LEVEL. WE HOPE THAT THIS WILL SUPPORT A CALM, COLLABORATIVE AND ENJOYABLE EVENT FOR EVERYONE.

Our tips


- BE CLEAR ABOUT THEIR
- COMMITMENT COMMUNICATE YOUR GOALS
- FOR THE EVENT ENCOURAGE THEM TO SHARE
- THEIR ATTENTION BETWEEN ATTENDEES
 - ASK THEM TO DELEGATE SKILL-APPROPRIATE TASKS TO ATTENDEES.


Essentials

Nice To Haves

Space

Think about how to use your space best. Look to create different zones where multiple people can work on similar projects with repairers distributed amongst the zones.

CONSIDER PLACING AN ALL-ROUND REPAIRER AT — THE DOOR FOR ARRIVALS, THEY CAN HELP DIRECT PEOPLE TO THE STARTING POINT FOR THEIR REPAIR PROJECT.



Participate

Here's our suggestions on how we ran our events to help foster collaboration, community and participation.

Key facts

- 2-HOUR WORKSHOPS
- 3 FOCUS ZONES
- 6 EVENTS WITH 6 THEMES:
 - 1. GENERAL REPAIRS
 - 2. RIPS & HOLES
 - 3. FASTENINGS & ALTERATIONS
 - 4. DARNING & KNITWEAR
 - 5. DENIM REPAIR
 - 6. ALTER YOUR TEE

Some Common Steps

- ALL-ROUNDER REPAIRER GREETS ATTENDEES AT THE DOOR AND ASKS ABOUT THEIR CLOTHES TO REPAIR.
- WELCOME AND BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO THE EVENT FOCUS TO DRAW EVERYONE TOGETHER.
- OPTIONAL: A SHORT INTRODUCTION IF THE SESSION IS FOCUSED ON A SPECIFIC TECHNIQUE, THIS MIGHT INVOLVE SHOWING EXAMPLES OR EXPLAINING THE REPAIR STEPS.
- REPAIRERS ASSIST ATTENDEES TO WORK ON THEIR PROJECTS
- CHECK IN POINTS WHERE COORDINATORS AND REPAIRERS CHECK THAT ALL ATTENDEES ARE BEING HELPED.
- LAST CHECK-IN AS THE EVENT HEADS TOWARDS CLOSE TO MAKE SURE THAT ALL ATTENDEES HAVE A PLAN FOR COMPLETING THEIR PROJECT, EITHER IN REMAINING TIME, OR AT HOME.
- EVENT CONCLUDES AND EVERYTHING IS PACKED UP, MAKE NOTE OF ANY SUPPLIES THAT MIGHT NEED REPLACING.

THERE WAS A CALL-OUT FROM A REPAIRER HALFWAY THROUGH THE WORKSHOP "DOES ANYONE NEED HELP?", AND THEN ANOTHER 20 MINUTES LATER "DOES ANYONE NEED A HAND?". THIS REALLY HELPED THE VIBE IN THE ROOM.

AT THREE QUARTERS OF THE WAY THROUGH THE SESSION, THE SPACE FELT LIKE A FOCUSED HIVE OF ACTIVITY.
